
# Winter Newsletter 2023





## Principals Message



Students, families and our fantastic Leesbrook community, we feel privileged to be writing to you, to wish you well over the Christmas holiday period.

As you will be aware, our second cohort of Year 11 students sat their exams in the summer which resulted in our best results so far. We are proud to say that these results placed us in the top three academies in Oldham. This is testament to the combined efforts of our staff and students throughout their Leesbrook journey.

Our current Year 11 students have just completed their Mock Exams. We have been so impressed with the way this year group have conducted themselves throughout a gruelling two weeks. The commitment, resilience, and dedication to this series of exams was just amazing and I am sure the students will get the results they worked so hard for.

As we continue to grow, we have encountered new challenges for Leesbrook. This has led to us making changes to the structures of our teams and recruiting members of staff to lead in new areas of the academy. One of our most significant changes has been to our Pastoral and Safeguarding teams. We now have multiple leaders for each year group who work tirelessly to know their year group in such detail that they can offer bespoke support whenever it is required. Many of our students are now benefitting from the individual support our Pastoral team are now able to offer alongside 'Place 2 Be' (our Mental Health Experts) and the Safeguarding team. As part of the support given to students, we are delighted to be working in collaboration with Manchester City and Commando Joe's; just two of our in-school interventions aimed at improving student attitude and attainment.

So far this year, we have managed to give multiple opportunities to our students to grow outside of the curriculum which has included experiences in the academy with external agencies, and various educational visits which all build on their cultural capital. We will continue to develop this area of academy life so that we maintain our vision of producing culturally enriched citizens.

An area of the academy which has grown significantly, and long may it keep growing, is the Rewards and House System. It has been so pleasing to see so many of our Leesbrookers being rewarded for their excellent attitude to their work, excellent attendance and behaviour or a particular talent they have demonstrated as part of the House competitions. This is an area in an academy which is often neglected, but at Leesbrook we see it as a high priority.

However, we would like to make a plea to all parents, carers and students around attendance and punctuality. It is crucial that all our students make every effort to be in school every day, and on time so that they can maximise their learning time, which in turn maximises their opportunities in later life.

We look forward to 2024 with even more optimism and thank you for all your continued support. Wishing you all the very best for this special holiday period.

# Principals Message



### **Teaching and Learning**

This Autumn term was extremely positive for our Leesbrook family as we saw the publication of the 2023 GCSE results data. Whilst the Y11 pupils receive their results in August, the school's overall achievements are not made public until October, and I am pleased to confirm we have achieved our best ever GCSE results. Attainment was significantly up on last year and our 'Progress 8' measure, the key metric for school performance, was +0.14, placing us in the top 3 schools in the local authority and top 2 secondary schools (out of 20) within the Oasis Trust. This is testament to the hard work of our pupils and the dedication of our fantastic staff who always go 'the extra mile' to support our Leesbrookers.

The excellent results we have achieved are not possible without positive relationships between staff and pupils, and one of the key ways we build these is with the continuation of our Rewards Programme led by Mr Feather, Mr Philp an Mr Mahfooz. I'm proud of all our students who have contributed positively to academy life. Whether it be one of the 100s of students who have been nominated by subject teachers for 'Student of the Week', or having the courage to perform in front of a live audience at our recent Y7 'Sing Up' Music event which saw every student in the year give a joyful, uplifting performance. I'm frequently reminded of just what a pleasure it is to be part of our Leesbrook family.

On a personal note, this is a bittersweet time for myself as it will be my last Teaching and Learning newsletter as I shall be leaving Leesbrook at the end of the Autumn term. I have been with the school since we first opened our doors in September 2018 and it has been a privilege to be part of its journey from a school of 220 pupils and 12 staff in temporary accommodation, to the large thriving successful school it is today. I'd like to thank all pupils, parents and staff for their support, particularly Mr Kolbuck and Mr Fowler whom along with myself have led the school during Ms Livesey's maternity leave. I have learned a lot from them and shall take this with me as I commence my new role as Headteacher of Edgar Wood Academy in Middleton.

## **Character** Curriculum



Character Development sits at the heart of all that we do at Leesbrook, and there has been much to celebrate since starting term in September. Through Character Reading in Family Time, pupils have been able to benefit from one of the most diverse reading collections in the country, including new youth fiction novels such as "Kind of Spark" and "Homeboys", as well as classics such as "The Philosopher's Stone" and "When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit". Through these novels, our pupils have been able to explore the positive character virtues that we want all of our Leesbrookers to develop and carry through to adulthood.

Through the taught Character Curriculum in Family Time, pupils have explored a wide variety of themes as part of their Personal Development.

Year 7 have examined Life at Leesbrook and Rights and Responsibilities, exploring what it means to be a Citizen of Modern Britain.

Year 8 have explored the issue of Diversity and Respect, examining the nature of Modern Britain as a proudly diverse society and the responsibilities that we must all take-up in order to keep Britain proudly diverse and equal.

Our Year 9 pupils have completed a unit of work on Money Matters, examining the key life skills of budgeting and saving as well as completing a case study on pay-day loans. They have explored the theme of Respecting Our Bodies, looking at physical health, mental and emotional health, body image and eating disorders.

Leesbrookers in Year 10 have examined the challenging theme of Mental Wellness exploring everything from the neuro-science of brain development during childhood and adolescence to the power of mindfulness in every-day life; whilst Year 11 have demonstrated their maturity through the examination of Healthy Relationships.



### **Cultural** Enrichment



This academic year we have offered over 40 cultural enrichment clubs each half term. These include GCSE revision clubs in every subject providing interventions for our Y10 and 11 students to achieve their potential.

We have provided several clubs for students to represent Leesbrook outside of the academy. We have a football team for each year, girls football teams, netball teams, table tennis teams, dodgeball teams and recently a coach from Sales Shark Rugby Club has been attending the academy providing enrichment for students who are interested in rugby.

As part of our cultural enrichment offer, we like to give students the opportunity to achieve a variety of qualifications and certificates. We have had students complete the inspiring digital enterprise award we have been training the next cohort of sports leaders who have run sessions for children in the local primary schools.


The second Competition was an Art competition. The students had to redesign our 9 habits in a graffiti style. All the entries were amazing and are now on display for the whole school to see.

#### Year 7

It has been an absolute delight welcoming our new Year 7s to Geography at Leesbrook and we have made a wonderful start to the year by first examining our local Geography before thinking about the wider global system. We have now moved on to explore social and economic development across the world, specifically how development across the world is different.

#### Year 8

In Year 8 we started the year by examining our world's changing population and urbanisation. We specifically spent time looking at how urban change in Mumbai has created both opportunities and challenges for the local people. Since half term we have been examining cold environments (Mr Jones' all time favourite!). We have been looking at how ice has shaped the landscape through erosion and deposition.

#### Year 9

In Year 9 we have spent our first half term looking at a variety of ways that the world, and it's geography, is interconnected. To this we examined the impacts of the Eyjafjallajökull eruption in Iceland in 2010 and more recently, the coronavirus pandemic. We then moved on to think how our actions today will cause threats in the future such as coral bleaching and overpopulation.



#### Year 10

Year 10 have made a very positive start to their GCSE course by completing both Natural Hazards and Urban Issues and Challenges. We have now started a challenging unit looking at our UK Physical Geography, specifically how the landscape has been created through erosion and deposition at the coast and by our rivers.

#### Year 11

Year 11 have worked incredibly hard in preparation for the mock exams and have been rewarded for their effort, resilience, and enthusiasm. Keep up the effort! We are now finishing off Challenges of Resource Management before starting our extensive fieldwork and revising for the Summer Exams!





#### Year 7

In September we welcomed our new Year 7 cohort who have settled in to their English classes excellently; they have started with reading about different Greek Myths and Legends and have read about the defiant Antigone who stands up for what she believes in, against the tyrannical King Creon. Our Year 7's have been incredibly interested in this topic and have shown great enthusiasm!

#### Year 8

Our Year 8 classes began their studies on Shakespeare! They have learned about the conversations of a tragedy and the different types of Shakespearian stories. They have specifically focused on Romeo and Juliet in keeping with the topic on tragedies.

#### Year 9


Continuing with their learning of Shakespeare, Year 9 have been learning about the dangers of jealousy and manipulation in the Shakespearean tragedy Othello.


During the evening, they went bowling, and out for meals at different restaurants.

### **Design Technology**

Year 9 students recently completed a Design and Technology project to design and make clocks in HIPs plastic, inspired by the interests of their target market. The brief asked them to develop colourful yet balanced designs which they could "realise" plus introducing them to more complex manufacturing methods. The first step was to create drawings, then the marking out and cutting of a mould or form to be able to use on the Vacuum former machine. then sawing, filing and fine finishing using various grades of sandpaper.

The clocks were all carefully crafted by hand with machinery such as the vacuum former and pillar drill.

### **History**

Our Year 7s have made a fantastic start to life at Leesbrook. They have started their history learning journey with a study of 'the world in the year 1000.' They have been exploring the physical and symbolic connections between the Byzantine Empire in Constantinople and the Islamic Empire in Baghdad and Cordoba. They have engaged enthusiastically in discussion and developed their understanding of the work of a historian by delving into concepts such as empire, power and religion.

Our Year 8s have also been introduced to the new History curriculum, starting with a study of the English Reformation and more recently studying the Greater Mughals and their conquest of South Asia. We have discussed what mattered to the Mughals and the legacy they have left behind.

Year 9 started the year with a study of democracy and women's suffrage. More recently we have completed our unit on the causes of the outbreak of the First World War. We are now looking at the outcomes and cost of the War on the lives of different people around the world. Our pupils are positively engaged in the rigour and diversity of the topics.

Our Year 10s have made an excellent start to the rigour of GCSE History, starting with a new 'Migration Through Time' unit. We started our study of migration to England in the 9<sup>th</sup> century looking the Vikings. We have moved into the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Century and are studying the role of the expanding British Empire and its connection with increased migration.

Year 11 as always have shown resilient in their GCSE studies. Our Year 11s have recently completed their first round of mock exams for this year. We hope this will give them the motivation and insight into the importance of revision and consistency to succeed in their GCSE exams this year. This term we have been studying for our period study unit 'The American West.' Here, we have explored the changes in the lives of indigenous Americans and the role of Europeans settlers in changing the structure of this part of the world.





A Literacy intervention programme, Lexia PowerUp, has been introduced at Oasis Academy Leesbrook. Lexia is a structured and systematic approach to literacy created for student reading and literacy development. The programme, ran by Ms Moore, Ms Massey, Ms Shaukat, Ms Maguire and Ms Meacock, has provided students at Oasis with confidence in their own abilities through innovative, effective and proven literacy solutions. Lexia covers three strands of literacy development: word study, comprehension and grammar. The programme immerses students in an age-appropriate learning experience that is tailored to their individual strengths and weaknesses, allowing them to fully access and engage in the secondary curriculum. ### **Mathematics**

In lessons our Leesbrookers have been working hard at developing their mathematical skills and knowledge. Currently this half term, our Year 7's have been recapping and building upon their knowledge from primary school as well as strengthening their algebraic skills, a new concept for many of our students. Year 8 have been deepening their algebraic skills and combining skills to plot linear graphs. Year 9 have also been building on their algebraic skills, in the form of solving equations, expanding and factorising expressions. Year 10 have been working on percentages and exploring the different career paths that would use percentages, for example, in one lesson, they were acting as investment consultants and offered advice to clients about which bank was best for them. Our Year 11's have also been busy revising for their mocks where they completed a full set of maths papers. To celebrate Black History Month, the maths department also ran a competition where students designed a poster celebrating a famous black woman mathematician. Our winner was Michelle in 11A with second place going to Aysha 7L. Lastly, a special shout out to the following students who had been nominated for student of the week by the maths department this autumn term: Aysha 7L, Wania 9P, Maryam 10L, and Al-Ameen 10L. #### Year 7

Year 7 family groups have completed 'Sing Up', a topic which promotes confidence and the ability to perform in front of their peers and others. The culmination of this saw every single Year 7 student singing together in the main hall in front of parents and carers, the first of this type of event to take place at Leesbrook. The Year 7s sounded fantastic, performing 'Can you feel the love tonight' (from The Lion King), 'Two Sea Shanties' and 'Where is the Love' by Black Eyed Peas.

The Year 7 students are now working on a topic titled 'Stomp', which teaches them the importance of rhythm and pulse.

#### **Cultural Enrichment**

More students than ever are now staying behind after school to practice, with guitar club, band skills and singing club being offered each week. The school's next music showcase, is our Winter showcase, taking place on 19th December. We hope to see you there to celebrate the excellent work and progress that our students are making!



#### Year 8

Year 8 have completed a topic on the computers using a program called Garageband to arrange and record a section of Haydn's trumpet concerto, enabling them to further develop their recording and editing skills. In their other topic so far this year, Year 8 have also used our full class set of acoustic guitars to learn a variety of chords and riffs.

#### Year 9

Students in Year 9 have further increased their GarageBand skills and knowledge, using their musicianship to record a more challenging piece of music – Beethoven's 5th Symphony. In their other unit so far, Year 9 have been working together in small groups during the 'Band Skills Unit 2' to perform a popular piece of music using drum kit, bass guitar, electric guitar, and keyboard. This requires our Year 9s to play chords, riffs and drum beats accurately as part of an ensemble.







It has been a very busy and successful start to the year for the PE department at Oasis Academy Leesbrook. We are always continuously working hard to fulfil our department Mission.

#### Sale Sharks: Project Rugby

This year we have continued to broaden the experiences of pupils in PE: we have developed a partnership with Sale Sharks Rugby Union who have been in school delivering coaching sessions. Project Rugby is designed to introduce as many people as possible to rugby, engage new audiences and stimulate a lifelong interest in the game. Since the programme began, it has engaged more than 75,000 young people.

Alongside the plethora of clubs we offer in the academy, our Football teams across all year groups compete regularly in the Oldham Schools Football League and cup competitions. We regularly compete in a number of sports across the borough within the Oldham School Sports Partnership with sports including Basketball, Cricket, Athletics, Netball, Handball and Badminton to name a few. Special mention to our girls PE department who have been working hard to increase girls' participation in extra-curricular this year.







#### **Oldham Schools Games**

More success for our pupils! In July over 50 of our pupils competed in the Oldham Schools Athletics Championships, hosted by Radclyffe School. ### **Science**

Our KS3 students have been learning about particles and the effect of drag on objects as well as making parachutes to time how long they take to fall. Halloween was marked by making slime in STEM club as well as rainbow in a test tube. Year 10's have been dissecting hearts in their biology module with surprisingly more squeamish boys than girls!

Our Year 8 students have really enjoyed the space topic with many questions that sparked some debate. They have also enjoyed making planets in the STEM club for the model solar system. Some of the year 8's will enjoy a trip to Jodrell Bank in 2024 and take part in using the large telescope to see space. Botanical book marks have been enjoyed by all as part of a well being session linked to Science ahead of open evening earlier in the school year







### **Religous Education**

Our Leesbrookers have impressed the Humanities Team with their philosophical minds, understanding of faith and readiness to both ask and answer deep and meaningful questions about life. Throughout the last term, Year 7 have been immersed in the study of what it means to be human, examining different worldviews about the nature and purpose of human beings through the exploration of creation accounts. Year 8 have been exploring whether or not it is possible to convincingly prove the existence of God. They have grappled with the philosophical arguments around design, miracles, logic and morality, before evaluating whether any of these theories enable us to definitively prove the existence of God. Year 9, on the other hand, have been engaged in an extended study on how humans make moral decisions. They have mastered challenging ethical approaches to making moral decisions including virtue ethics, situation ethics and utilitarianism, before moving on to explore how divine laws can shape and determine our moral choices in life.

All of our Year 10 pupils study GCSE Religion, Philosophy and Ethics, and have made an impressive start to their course. So far this year they have examined the broad theme of Relationships, applying their knowledge of religion and humanism to questions linked with family, marriage, divorce and gender equality. 


### Art & Design

Year 8 students have been working on their 'Day of the Dead' Project this term and have produced some fantastic work!

The Day of the Dead (Spanish: Día de Muertos) is a Mexican holiday celebrated throughout Mexico on 1st and 2nd of November. This 2-day national festival involves family and friends gathering to pray for and remember friends and family members who have died, and helping support their spiritual journey. The Year 8 'Day of the Dead' involves the students having introductory lessons about the festival and its importance,

exploring Spanish language elements associated with it, designing art work and creating decorative clay skulls, in imitation of the sugar skulls that are made in Mexico to gain an experience of the 'Day of the Dead' Festival.








### **Computing**

# SEND & Inclusion



### Speech and Language Therapy (SALT)

This term we began Speech and Language interventions with a therapist who comes in once a fortnight. They offer support and guidance to staff on how to better support the students. They also complete assessments with our students.

#### EHCP's

We now have an Educational Psychologist who comes in one day every term and is working through educational psychological assessments to support our students with educational healthcare plans and to support us in applications for EHCP's.



In addition to this we have regular visits from the vision impairment team who come in regularly to offer support and advice for some of our students. A NHS registered physiotherapist is now coming in to offer physio training to support staff to allow physio exercises to take place for certain students.

We are currently getting more Support staff trained on First Aid courses to support our lovely Leesbrookers around the academy.

The Oldham QEST team have been in school too, offering free advice to teachers on SEND. The QEST team will now next be on 12th February 2024.

Students have completed their NGRT Assessments and Phonics has started across school. The Director of SEND is now completing language and speech screening with our lovely Year 7s

# SEND & Inclusion



#### Place2Be provision

Oasis Academy Leesbrook now works with Place2Be, a mental health charity that helps young people to explore their emotions and feel better about themselves.

When I feel worried, it's like I'm in a maze and the people in Place2Be are coming with a torch and showing me the way" – student

"My daughter had become such a different person – one we didn't recognise – but since counselling we see signs of our old loving daughter coming back." – Parent

Sometimes young people can feel particularly anxious, low, confused or angry.

Maybe something difficult happened at home, like losing a family member or parents separating. Or perhaps they're struggling with something at school, like bullying.

This can make them behave differently, lose confidence in themselves or find it difficult to concentrate in class.

Place2Be is there to help young people find ways to cope, so their worries don't get in the way of their friendships, their learning or how they feel about themselves.

Place2Be's professionals work with young people one-to-one or in small groups, giving regular support for pupils who need it.

Young people can also book a short appointment to talk about any problems or worries they have – this is called Place2Talk. Please contact Maya Daly-Williams—Maya.Daly-Williams@oasisleesbrook.org

As well as working with children, Place2Be can also offer support for parents and carers of children attending our school.

#### Rise Workshop

Earlier this year we had "Rise" in to do workshops with our year 10 students.

Our students gained lots of new skills throughout this workshop including interview and career skills. Students got to listen to speakers from a range of different companies to help them develop core skills that link their curriculum to the workplace.

The workshop aimed to promote confidence and professionalism for when the students begin their careers and even for their college interviews.

# **Behaviour &**Expectations



It was a pleasure to welcome back our students in September and open our doors to our new Year 7's. Exemplary behaviour, which embodies the Oasis 9 habits, is crucial to support all students to be happy, emotionally balanced and successful. Our ethos is one of celebration and a culture of being proud. We believe for student achievement to be maximised, effective collaborative working relationships between teachers, support staff and students alongside a zero tolerance approach to bullying are essential. This was recognised in our 'Good' Ofsted inspection in January 2023.

I am delighted to share that over the first term up to the writing of this newsletter, our students have generally displayed exemplary behaviour and conduct across the academy. Student's hard work and enthusiasm for learning has been recognised by their teachers and support staff, awarding over 79,000 achievement points via Class Charts across all year groups in addition to regular nominations for 'Student of the Week' and other methods to praise and recognise student achievement. What a fantastic individual and collective achievement by our wonderful Leesbrook students! Year 7 alone have gained over 15,000 achievement points this year so far which is absolutely amazing! Keep up the great work year 7! It is clear we have many local, national and global leaders making their way through their Leesbrook careers!



Please be aware both parents and students can also access Class Charts to monitor behaviour during the academy day. Please ensure you have access to Class Charts to track your child's behaviour. The Class Charts app can be downloaded via your usual app download store and login details shared via our Reception desk or by calling 0161 290 4000.

Our classroom behaviour policy at Leesbrook is simple. Students receive a Reminder, Warning and then an Action for persistent failure to meet our high expectations. Each stage of the upscale is recorded on the board with the students' name being placed under each heading. The teacher will clearly communicate the reason for the Reminder/Warning/Action each time to enable the student to reflect on their behaviour and help the restorative process. An Action is a same day 10 minute detention and is communicated home through Class Charts and if possible, a phone call home. If this is not attended the sanction escalates to 20 minutes the following day with the Curriculum Leader and if this is then missed, your child must attend a 30 minute sanction with their Year Group team. This is non-negotiable. If you have any concerns for your child's behaviour in school, please contact the appropriate Year Group Lead.

Oasis Leesbrook will continue to fully utilise the behaviour and rewards strategies as well as the Leesbrook Behaviour For Learning Policy to promote acceptable behaviours across the academy. We do so in order to relentlessly strive to support students to achieve their god given potential at Leesbrook. The amendment of the sanctions policy in May 2023 has benefited students immensely and supported more positive behaviours within the academy. Oasis Leesbrook works tirelessly through staff professional development, funding of external providers such as Commando Joes and City in the Community to find creative and effective strategies to challenge and modify unacceptable behaviour when it does occur. Each year group also has access to an array of measures to support students to take accountability for any mistakes, resolve conflict with peers and make the best choice possible for themselves and their education via their Pastoral Year Group teams.

Oasis Leesbrook has some of the lowest suspension and permanent suspension figures in the borough and within Oasis nationally. We are very proud of our students and will continue to exhaust all avenues to support students to make the right choice. Leesbrook chooses to suspend students as a last resort but recognises this will be necessary if the behaviour displayed warrants this significant and high level sanction. We demand and expect the very highest standards from our students and staff as we truly believe the community we serve deserves the best education provision possible. Good behaviour is a vital aspect of our collective effort to mould our young people into happy, successful and informed individuals who our community can look upon with pride and admiration.

# **Behaviour &**Expectations



The Academy aims to ensure that attendance for all pupils remains at 96% or higher, thank you to all parents and carers that continue to work with us. Helping to create a pattern of regular attendance is everybody's responsibility, including parents/carers, students, and staff.

However, please note it is your legal duty as a parent/carer to ensure that your child is on time to school and attends regularly. Be aware that, should your child arrive regularly late to school, or is regularly absent from school without a valid or accepted reason, you could be fined or prosecuted by Oldham Local Authority Attendance Team. Absences or attendance related matters must be reported each day via the absence line (0161 290 4000, option 1) prior to 08:15 and/or emailed through to attendance@oasisleesbrook.org.

Attendance for all students is compulsory and parents have a legal responsibility to ensure their child attends school regularly. Any absence without good reason will be treated as unauthorised and can lead to a Penalty Notice from Oldham Council and home visits from the Leesbrook Attendance Team. In order to maximise individual achievement, parents should avoid making routine appointments for students during the Academy day. Parents should not take family holidays during the term time period. The Local Authority has the power to fine parents if their child is absent from school without authorisation. Please note, the academy will not authorise holiday during term time.
